# FROM REV. KELLY'S DESK

Remember the packets of sunflower seeds?

June, 2014

When High River, Alberta's United church made a Facebook appeal for sunflower seeds in March, they weren't certain they'd reach 4,000 — one packet for every mailbox in town. Less than three months later, the congregation has received **18,000** seed packets to help clean up flood-ravaged soil and remind residents they're not alone. The church's clergy team, Rev. Susan Lukey, and husband Rev. David Robertson, heard about the benefits of planting sunflowers from folks in New Orleans, post Hurricane Katrina. While most plants can't survive in soil infused with heavy metals, the rapidly growing sunflower can absorb numerous toxins and lock them into its cells. But they also imagined the project as a way to bring brightness, hope and courage to the community. The church met its goal by its mid-April deadline, but the seeds just kept on rolling in – including some from NMUC!

In a town still recovering, where people lost homes and valuables to the flood waters, some simple seeds may seem odd. But these seeds hold within themselves the promise of brilliant yellow flowers, big bright heads bobbing in the breeze, redeeming the soil, and bringing cheer to the heart. These seeds, sent from all across the country, bear hope. And they embody the UCC at its best: reminding folks that we are not alone, but joined as one great big family of faith across this country.

Whether you are gardeners or golfers, loungers or adventurers, may this summer find you all taking some tender time for yourselves, friends. Join us when you can Sunday mornings at 10:30, and drop by through the week to keep an eye on the progress of our Accessibility project! I'll make the coffee!

#### FROM THE UCW

India is a land of great contradictions: hauntingly beautiful and with much wealth: but also a place of astounding slums teeming with children in despair. Leena Barua



On Sunday, May 25<sup>th</sup>, the UCW led the service when Rev. Kelly and Dorothy Webster were away at Maritime Conference. They centered it around the exceptional work done by the organization 'Families For Children', founded by Canadian Sandra Simpson. Simpson, already a mother of 4 living in Montreal, adopted a little girl in 1970, Mai Lien, from Viet Nam. Over the next three decades, she personally adopted 28 children and helped hundreds of other Canadian families adopt from Asia in the 1970's.

Simpson was part of a small group of mothers who took leadership of Canada's first major wave of international adoptions because they believed a Canadian family was the best gift they could give to children whose lives and futures had been disrupted by war, poverty, and civil unrest.

In time, Sandra Simpson focused her energy on building care facilities abroad – in India and Bangladesh - that allowed children to stay within their homeland. It is FFC's orphanage at Podanur Junction, near Coimatore, in South India that our UCW have been supporting for some twelve years. And the need in this particular place is great: In India 1 in 10 children is disabled. Less than half reach adulthood. And less than 1 percent have access to education. But one small organization is changing this!

At FFC orphanage they take care of over 400 children – all with special needs. The atmosphere is that of a home rather than an institution.

A volunteer who travels regularly to India says: At FFC, they do not try and find families to adopt these children. That is because they already are a family: a very large and very loving family. A family with a future of hope:

Families For Children make sure the children are educated, teaching them skills that allow them all to contribute. Some stay on at the mission as adults, working in this place that has been home to them: Kalai came to the mission as an infant. She went on to get a Masters Degree in Business – and she now runs the Families For Children office.

Thangeray was brought to the mission at one year of age, with polio. He has received a college degree and is the proud and happy Librarian at FFC.

In our UCW Statement of Purpose we say that service is a way we demonstrate our love for Jesus. As members of the United Church of Canada, our creed reminds us that we are people called "to love and serve others." We feel we are blessed and privileged to be contributors to these children's lives in our own small way.

[With thanks to Leena Barua of Fredericton (originally of Calcutta, India, and a former neighbor in New Maryland) who has helped to transform our sanctuary with the loan of beautiful saris, fabrics of silk and cashmere (from Kashmir, India) and wooden articles, all from her native India.]

Here is a Green Tip to help make your summer more enjoyable:



Mosquito Repellent: In a Mason jar put liquid citronella (can be found in home improvement stores). Using a hammer and nail, put a hole in the lid of the jar. Put an all cotton wick or string through the hole, put the lid on the jar and give the wick about ten minutes to absorb the citronella oil, then light. Other types of bottles can be used, as well as adding small pebbles or glass discs to the jar or bottle, so use your imagination to make an attractive oil lamp repellent.


